

## FEASTDAY IN NOVEMBER:

**THE ENTRANCE OF THE THEOTOKOS INTO THE TEMPLE – NOVEMBER 21st** *From the Prologue of Ochrid by St. Nikolai Velimirovich* 

When the most holy Virgin Mary had reached the age of three, her parents, holy Joachim and Anna, took her from Nazareth to Jerusalem, to give her to the service of God in fulfillment of their promise. It was three days journey to Jerusalem, but, going as they were on God's work, they did not find the journey difficult. Many of Joachim and Anna's kinsmen gathered to take part in this celebration, in which the invisible angels of God also took part. Maidens went ahead with lighted candles in their hands,



followed by the most holy Virgin, led on either side by her father and mother. The Virgin was clad in royal and beautiful garments, like those of the 'king's daughter', the Bride of God (Ps. 44:9,10). Behind them walked many of their

kinsfolk and friends, all bearing lighted candles. There were fifteen steps leading to the Temple. Her parents stood the Virgin on the first step, and she ran quickly to the top on her own, where the High Priest, Zacharias, the father of St John the Forerunner, met her and, taking her by the hand, led her not only into the Temple but into the Holy of Holies, the holiest place of all, into which none could enter except the High Priest, and that once a year. St Theophylact of Ochrid says that Zacharias was 'out of himself, and moved by God' when he led the Virgin into the chief place in the Temple, beyond the second curtain otherwise there could be no explanation of his action. Her parents then offered sacrifices to God, according to the Law, received the priest's blessing and returned home, leaving the most holy Virgin in the Temple. She dwelt in the Tem-ple for nine whole years. While her parents were alive, they visited her often. When they departed this life, the holy Virgin was left an orphan, and longed to remain in the Temple for the rest of her days, without entering into marriage. This being contrary both to the Law and Israelite custom, she was confided at the age of twelve to St Joseph, a kinsman of hers in Nazareth, so that she might, under the protection of betrothal, live in virginity and thus fulfill both her desire and the demands of the Law, for it was unknown in Israel at that time for a girl to vow perpetual virginity. The holy Virgin Mary was the first to do this, and was later followed by thousands of virgin men and women in the Church of Christ.

#### WHEN DID THE NATIVITY FAST ORIGINATE?

We do not know precisely at what date the observance of the Nativity Fast (Advent) was introduced into the Church. Documents establish that, towards the end of the fourth century, the Nativity of Christ was celebrated by some on December 25th and by others on January 6th.

The Council of Saragossa, in Spain, decided (in 380) that, from December 17th until Epiphany, no one could absent himself from services. In Gaul (modern day France), in the sixth century, a sort of Lent was observed from November 11th until Christmas. Advent was celebrated in Rome, under Pope St. Gregory the Great, towards the end of the sixth century.

The Nativity Fast seems to have come into the practice of the Churches of the Byzantine rite a little later when in the ninth century the Greeks fasted from November 15th through Christmas.

#### **ON FASTING**

Orthodox Christians believe that their spiritual lives start with their stomachs. They believe that when peoples' eating is right their spirits can be more open to God and more attentive to all that is good, true, and beautiful in life. When, on the contrary, peoples' eating is wrong, their minds are disordered; their emotions are rebellious; and their flesh rules their being and behavior in harmful ways.

Right eating means to eat the right foods in the right amounts at the right times in the right ways for the right reasons. People who eat properly prepare and partake of their meals with discipline and dignity, free from emotional drives and carnal desires. They do this to serve God, their fellow creatures, and their own well-being more effectively, fruitfully, and joyfully.

The Church provides guidelines for healthy eating and sane fasting. The Lord Jesus Christ is the first and final Teacher on the subject, as He is on all others.

Christ and His apostles feasted and fasted. They affirmed that God gives all foods to be enjoyed with thanksgiving (Act 10:10-15; Rom 14:6). They also warned that eating can become idolatrous. St. Paul, for exam-ple, speaks of "persons (who) do not serve our Lord Christ, but their own belly" (Rom 16:18). "Their end," he says, "is destruction, their god is their belly, and they glory in their shame, with minds set on earthly things" (Phil 3:19).

The Scriptures and the Saints teach that in eating and fasting, moderation is the rule for it leads to freedom from the carnal passions: lust, greed, anger, sadness, sloth, and despondency. While excesses of any kind are harmful and destructive, leading to either to gluttony and drunkenness, or to pride, vainglory, ungodly zeal, condemnation of others, and spiritual delusion.

#### The September 2008 Parish Council meeting was

held in the church hall on Monday, September 29, 2008. Warden Paul Salina called the meeting to order at 7pm. A quorum was noted and the meeting began with "O Heavenly King".

Pastor's Report: Father David indicated that the month of September has been a bit strange. The Met- Inc/Exp ropolitan Council and the Holy Synod of Bishops met in the beginning of September. Bishop Benjamin presented the special investigative report (it can be found on the OCA website). Metropolitan Herman has retired and the Holy Synod has accepted his resignation. There will be changes in the Metropolitan Council. As a result, the All-American Council will now have to elect a new Metropolitan - work that previously took 5 days (as in past councils) will have to be completed in 3 1/2 days, due to the shortened length as a cost saving measure. Currently, there are 3 dioceses without Bishops (Alaska, Western Pennsylvania and New York/New Jersey). Archbishop Dmitri is the senior most Bishop. Archimandrite Jonah is to be consecrated on November 1 as Bishop of Ft. Worth. We will have 1 more parish council meeting before the All-American Council. Rosemary Delaney (our delegate) has asked the parish council for some direction. It is anticipated that a vote will be taken to lower the national assessment to parishes. The Diocesan Council met 2 days after our August council meeting and passed a resolution to ask Metropolitan Herman to retire. The secretary (Father David) sent a letter to the Metropolitan Council indicating the Diocesan resolution. The house owned by the diocese is in the process of being sold-the price was lowered as the house is in need of repairs. The Bishop's Circle for ONE Stewards has 7 individuals/ couples in the diocese-3 of them from our parish. They will be having lunch at Sturbridge Village with Bishop Nikon. Our parish continues to lead in giving to ONE Stewards. This summer 45 children and 15 staff members attended the Youth Rally. We had 2 staff members from our parish attend. Church School has started and we should have 3 new altar boys in a few weeks. We need to have a delegate for the Diocesan Assembly-Rosemary Delaney has agreed to attend.

<u>Secretary's Report:</u> Motion to accept the August 2008 minutes as submitted Marion Bichun/George Ludko. Motion carried.

Dan Bradanini has audited the August financial report as well as the July 21-Sept 20 cemetery reports. The July/August charity for the Special Olympics will be reflected in the September report. We collected \$551.00. We also collected \$435.00 for the September charity for Ed Day. George Ludko indicated he had to withdraw \$5K from the Neuberger cemetery fund to pay cemetery expenses. Motion to accept the August financial report Dan Telychka/ Diane Dounouk. Motion carried.

Warden's Report: Paul Salina received a thankyou card from the Fetzko's for our donation to the Gobezi Home in Africa. There was some graffiti on the garage door windows. The police were notified and they took a report and pictures. Paul reported that the Stregotsky home will not be donated to the church, apparently their caregivers were made the beneficiaries of the home. As Father David stated earlier, we should have some young altar boys in a few weeks. Paul has also instructed Jennifer Wykes and Alison Pulcini to rotate the remaining children who are old enough to assist with other duties, ie. the collection baskets. Nadine Cabrera contacted Paul regarding the recent activity on Wall St and as a result \$50K has been removed from the Columbia Fund and put into a CD at a local bank. This was done as a precaution.

#### **OLD BUSINESS**

\*Caretaker's House Paul Salina has contracted with Realty 3 (MaryJean Agostini) as the real estate agent. They will probably get 5% commission. He spent numerous hours at city hall trying to find the house and what the taxes would be. City hall has the house listed as 164 Farmington Ave and apparently even though pictures, identification etc could be proved-no one could correct it. Paul has turned this over to Attorney Steve Morelli who will be used for the closing. The asking price is \$123,900. The house can not be put on the market until we have the deed, taxes, correct property lines etc. The house was

also broken into again through the back basement door. Once again, Paul has secured the house adding 3 2x4's and a cleat. There was no apparent damage. The unoccupied property is now becoming a dangerous liability. We do have insurance on the property. \*Project Management Review The Sunday School refurbishing project is now complete. Thank you to Dave and Phyllis Bartos for overseeing the tile/rug project. Dave presented organized bids. Thank you to all who helped move the furniture during this activity. Ed and Marion Bichun are looking into some metal rolling racks for under the sink counter storage. The fountain is to be replaced perhaps with a side drain for the dehumidifier. Marion Bichum will contact Bill Kapura regarding the hood installation of the stove and the fountain replacement. Eva Zagorska has donated a new vacuum (approx. value \$400). She also purchased the service contract and will purchase bags and upkeep as needed. Thank you Eva! Throughout all the rain we have had this year, the basement has remained dry and we are about 18" over the average rainfall so far. And most importantall the bills are paid. Thanks to all!!

\*Winter Snowplowing If you know anyone that is interested and we should get a bid from for this see Paul Salina. Paul will be contacting Michael Baruffi. We are looking for prices on snowfall accumulations of 2-4 inches, 5-7 inches, 8 or more inches, sanding only, as well as snow removal from sidewalks and stairs.

\*Interior Church Wall Painting/Touch Up The walls do need some scraping and painting at this time. It would be nice to get this completed by Christmas. We will have to repaint the entire interior before our 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

\*Cemetery Committee By-Law Changes/New Fee Structure Father David indicated the October newsletters will be out this week and will include the proposed changes and the date of November 2 for the special parish meeting. The by-laws state in Section I Next Meeting October 7, 2008. - under Internment Privileges of Members that the price structure is set by the parish body.

\*Diocesan Assembly Oct 24-25 Cumberland RI Motion for Rosemary Delaney to be our delegate George Ludko/Ellen Santoro. Motion carried. Rosemary Delaney is also our delegate to the All-American Council and she has asked for some direction. Father David indicated there is really nothing major on the agenda -just selling of the home and other normal business. Father David and George

Ludko (diocesan council member) will also be attending from our parish. We won't know what our assessments will be until we go to the All-American Council in Pittsburgh. We have 140 assessed members as of Sept. 2008. If you want to be an observer see Father David.

\*All-American Council Nov 10-13 Pittsburgh, PA Father David, Rosemary Delaney, Paul Culton (clergy pension board), and Paul Salina (observer and photographer) will be attending the All-American Council in Pittsburgh. The council had a discussion as to who would be the best candidate for the new Metropolitan. It was noted that the leading candidates may be Archbishop Seraphim, Archbishop Job and Bishop Benjamin. There was nothing hidden in the special investigative report given by Bishop Benjamin, he did a magnificent job. All reports and agendas can be found on the OCA website. Council members were urged to review the reports and come prepared the next meeting with any concerns so we can get a 1. 2. 3 order. We vote on the Metropolitan but the Holy Synod make the final decision. The actual election will take place Wednesday morning of the council after Divine Liturgy.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

\*Charity for November Motion for the Friendship Center to be the November Charity and Warm The Children be the December Charity, George Ludko/ Petter Steffick. Motion carried. We will also collect canned goods for the food bank-Diane Dounouk and Ann Myska will get a box set up.

From the Floor Thank you to Barbara Raymond for donating a coffee pot.

\*Adjournment Motion to adjourn 8:05pm by Marion Bichum. The meeting concluded with "It is Truly Meet".
